Although The poor weather on the Sunday dampened many street parties it didn't stop people having a fun filled holiday, when communities were able to meet again without restrictions.

Throughout the country there was a genuine feel-good feeling and even the Queen was moved by the love the public showed for her. On page two is a message from the Mayor about the celebrations, with pictures of some of the events which took place.

However the fun is set to continue with more events over the summer months, some of which we highlight in this issue.



BANDSTAND UPDATE I

fter the outpouring of good will towards the Queen during the Jubilee celebrations it seems more fitting than ever that St Ives should mark this milestone with a bandstand dedicated to our longest serving monarch.

The Town Team, which is organising the project would like to thank the many people who have already pledged support. Over the past fortnight we have received many pledges, mostly between £25 and £100, and this has helped us to exceed £30,000 towards the costs, a phenomenal sum in such a short time.

A true community effort

Although we have been awarded £5,000 from the Town Council towards this project, the vast majority of pledges have come from local people and companies showing once again that the people of St Ives are proud of their town as well as their monarch.

Also good news is that we have access to a beautiful bandstand, which only needs to be painted in the correct colours of black and gold, traditional colours used throughout St Ives town centre which match the existing street furniture. When we receive permission to erect the bandstand from the planners and with funds already pledged we should be able to get the bandstand erected pretty quickly and hopefully before the end of this jubilee year.

Can you help us raise the remaining £10,000?

We know times are difficult, and for many people a bandstand is low priority, but we hope that those of you who can afford to, will donate even a modest sum. We are asking people to donate any amount from £25 upwards and this should help us reach our total in the next couple of months.

St Ives is famous for the generosity of its people

As recent fundraising for Ukraine refugees showed, the people of St Ives are generous. This is a longstanding trait for in 1901 the town raised funds to erect the, now famous, statue of Oliver Cromwell in Market Hill. It is the only statue of him that was paid for by public subscription. It may not be appropriate to mention our monarch and Cromwell in the same piece, but never-the-less it's public donations that will also make the bandstand happen.

Although I was unable to attend, Friday evening saw a packed out Corn Exchange singing along to songs of the past 70 years at the Town Team event 'Singing in the Reign'. A number of residents tell me that this was a fun filled evening of joy and laughter.

Saturday arrived with a day packed full of events, starting with 42 Engineer Regiment exercising their freedom of St Ives. The soldiers marched with bayonets fixed down Bridge Street and on to Market Hill before the inspection of the troops, the Freedom Oath, The Mayors Address and the march past salute. Thousands attended. It was an honour for our town to have a full

Following the parade, we had entertainment from the 'Candy Girls'. After which I took the opportunity to attend the Saints Crafters Arts and Crafts Fair in

the Free Church where a number of stalls were displaying spectacular creations. The final event for myself on Saturday was the Big Open Air Concert, which saw the bands, the 'Queens of Disco' and the 'Amazing 80s'.

The atmosphere was electric as the crowd sang along and danced, it ended with another rendition of the National Anthem before the crowd headed to the Corn Exchange for their free Brit Pop gig.

colour and life to the town at every turn. Town Council to hold special meeting

At the end of a long speech in which he listed the achievements of the Authority so far and praised the work of the staff he said 'I am not walking away and look forward to working and cooperating with all of

you in the future to bring the positive differences we want for all our communities'. It is difficult to know exactly what has been going on. There has been much speculation in the

We would like to give a huge 'thank you' to HDC and Sport England for their funding, and to the mayor of St Ives for opening the facility'. Hunts Sailing Club was founded in 1954 and moved from the original River Great Ouse site to the current one within the town of St Ives in 1975. The club is an RYA Training Centre and runs a programme of youth and adult training courses, (sailing, power boat, first aid) and new members are always welcome.

The existing 13 Town Councillors will choose three of them at an Extraordinary Meeting of St Ives Town Council to be held in the Town Hall on Wednesday 22 June at 7.00 pm. Please note they are listed in no particular order.

Simon Brignell

I started working in St. Ives in 2007 as an IT professional. I'm now a commercial catering equipment engineer and have lived here since 2016.

Noticing an increasing lack of NHS dentists in the area, I founded a dentristry business in Huntingdon in 2021. Our campaign group has heard from hundreds of residents in St. Ives who have not been able to get an appointment with an NHS dentist and cannot afford to go private. The campaign has been featured in The Hunts Post, BBC Radio Cambridgeshire, and I am scheduled to give talks to local groups.

I want to work alongside our communities to ensure that their voices are heard on local matters whether they be about jobs, transport, or even access to NHS dentistry. The POWI campaign that opposes the new Envar incinerator at Woodhurst is a great example - many residents in St. Ives have highlighted the environmental impact of such a project, yet they feel unheard. Again with the ever-building problem of traffic moving through St Ives, they see housing projects going ahead but remain unheard when it comes to concerns regarding these important questions of supporting infrastructure. Many are also struggling with the cost of living crisis and want to see long-term solutions.

If we're committed to "levelling up" St. Ives, both in terms of wealth and infrastructure, the council needs to prioritise a long-term plan to tackle these and other issues by cooperating with both local communities and businesses. Feedback from the grassroots is invaluable and I believe I can assist in these tasks.

If selected as a councillor, I would ensure that local voices have the power to affect positive change within their communities and St. Ives itself, and I would act in their best interests.

Martin Gill

I have lived in St Ives since 1994 when I was posted to RAF Wyton as part of my Army career in The Royal Corps of Signals. I have now retired from army life and work as an IT project manager. My partner is an NHS Sister. I am very keen to help St Ives to continue to prosper and remain as one of the best places to live in the entire country. I have always believed that our small town manages to regularly punch above its weight by putting on excellent events such as: regular Monday markets, Bank Holiday markets, specialist markets on Saturday's, carnival, Remembrance Day and Christmas lights events.

The age-old adage of 'if you don't use it lose it' applies and I would dearly love to be in a position of influence to ensure such events continue. I was an advocate of and championed the Guided Busway, which has proved an immense benefit to St Ives by bringing in extra footfall from Cambridge for our town of many independent shops to thrive.

I recently stood as a Huntingdon District Councillor for St Ives South Ward and received an impressive 727 votes, following which I received a letter of appreciation from our MP, recommending me to stand for civil office again.

Michael Gleadow

I moved to St. Ives with my family in 1990 from Hertfordshire and after we looked at other towns and villages in the district we could see that St. Ives had the most to offer, being well placed for transport, employment, shopping and most importantly a great community spirit, which happily is thriving. I believe I can bring a lot to the Town Council from my life long career experience in local overnment, in environmental health. I worked at 7 district councils and I had frequent contact with town and parish councils, on licensing issues and complaints from members of the public, for example about noise, rodent control and environmental issues. As such I know about the roles of different levels of local government.

Collaborative working and cooperation between these levels is very important to provide good services. Poor communication, misunderstandings and so on mean poor service to Council Tax payers who are our customers and entitled to expect a high quality service, this is something I believe I can contribute to.

It's also important for the health of local democracy that there are good relationships between each level of local government. Having councils appearing to be at odds with each other does not encourage residents to take an interest in the work of local councils, to vote or to become more involved.

I believe I can contribute to the Town Councils important role in promoting and improving the town, supporting local businesses and residents and being a voice on issues such as transport, traffic and flooding risks. Having good contacts and relationships with agencies, like the Environment Agency and Highways Agency is important and what my approach would be.

Gilly Jackson

I wish to be considered for co-option for one of the vacancies on the St Ives Town Council. My commitment to the town is shown by my resume below, and this experience over the past twenty years will allow me to contribute as a team member amongst other town councillors. I grew up in St Ives, attending local schools. My

husband and I met at school, and after 30 years away, living in London then Buckinghamshire then Surrey, in 2000 we returned to live in St Ives. I have had a very rewarding working life, in finance and sales, taking early retirement in 2005 from a 20-year sales and marketing career.

Then I threw my energies into working voluntarily for the town, as a committee member for the St Ives Civic Society, and I was a founder member of ACE — Action Corn Exchange — proud that the Corn Exchange reopened in 2010 for community use.

I was a Director of St Ives Town Initiative as chair of the events committee which organised the Riverside Festival with Regatta and Dragon Boat Racing. In 2009 I formed the independent group FESt (Festival Events St Ives), a not-for-profit volunteer group which, with continued support from the St Ives Town Council, continues to hold up to 20 annual free events. I have been chairman from the beginning, but am now standing back whilst others take on responsibilities.

I have also been chairman of the organising committee for the hugely popular bi- annual Illuminated Boat Parade, but have now passed on that role for 2023. I remain a member of the Town Team. Finally, I have a paid part-time role contributing editorial content for the free independent town magazine St Ives NOW! I enjoy this as it promotes local events, groups, and businesses and keeps me in touch with what is happening in the town.

So now I am ready for a new challenge, that of

hopefully becoming a St Ives Town Councillor, and supporting the council as well as residents and businesses. I believe my experience outlined above will enable me to help the council do more to promote the town.

David McCandless

I am an ex-RAF officer, joined in 1961, commissioned in 1986 & retired in 2000 from RAF Wyton). I have been on the town's Electoral Register with my wife of 56 years as home owners since we moved from Somersham, in 1988. I have signed the Official Secrets Act, hold a current DBS Certificate and a clean driving licence since 1964.

On retirement from the RAF, I set up a successful database-design company. In 2000 I became an active member of the Huntingdonshire FSB and a volunteer member of the Branch Committee. In 2009, I joined the Town's Community Speedwatch Group and remained in the Speedwatch scheme until 2014 when, with the late Town Cllr John Davies and 2 other unpaid volunteer directors, we founded a complementary, not-for-profit company called Community Roadwatch(UK) CIC (CRW) to help Parishes accurately quantify and identify speeding hotspots. With our experience and accurate data we have been able to advise/find ways of moderating any speeding using our sponsored Data Loggers & Speed Indicating Devices, the data from which have been used to justify several successful local LHI applications.

I am grateful to have received the full support of the Town Council for CRW's ongoing (apparently stalled) 'Make Sawtry Way Safer' speed limit reduction 2018 LHI project.
