# Revealed: the true cost of the Tory run Council

The new administration at Huntingdonshire DC is grappling with some difficult decisions, not least the financial situation inherited from nearly 50 years of the Conservatives being in control.

proudly boasted that council tax rates in the district have been kept low or not raised at all. An approach that persisted up until last May's elections. The reality is that this aim required the Tories to find £805,000 of savings and use nearly all of its reserves (£2.48 million) to achieve a balanced budget this year. The current Executive Leader of HDC, Lib Dem Councillor Sarah Conboy, in her recent statement said 'Unless a rabbit pops out of a hat with a grant, or central government make a huge u-turn funding wise, we might be £3.285 million away from delivering a properly

balanced budget as things stand.

For the past decade or more the Conservatives

Difficult decisions will have to be made to find savings and this will undoubtedly impact upon the council's operational and strategic activities forcing HDC to scale back it's ambitions in order to meet its purse next year. Cllr Conboy continued 'that seems fitting given the challenge our residents also face'.

So following two years of a global pandemic, a cost-of-living crisis and people facing more difficult times it seems that HDC may have to cut back services just at the wrong time.

Could it have been so much better had the Tories made modest tax increases over the past decade ensuring that the reserves were available when really needed?





## Temporary Town Clerk leaves early

The Riverporter understands that Philip Truppin (right) who took up the post of Locum Town Clerk on 4th April (see RP 106), is on gardening leave after councillors gave him notice.

Mr Truppin had come out of retirement to be the Town's temporary Clerk, while Alison Benfield remains away from her post on sick leave (see RP113). The Council has been without a full-time Town Clerk for over 2 years. The previous Locum Clerk, Nicci Sewell, who was doing an excellent job, left in March, as she was appointed to a full-time post at another authority. We understand that the situation with Town Clerk Alison Benfield my soon be resolved, allowing the Council to advertise for a full-time Clerk. In the meantime Matthew Price, who is the Amenities Manager, has assumed the role of Locum Clerk and will be receive training to allow him to become a qualified Town Clerk. A clerk's role is very important as they are the officer who advises councillors on the correct procedures and like many other professions there are a shortage of trained clerks available. Clerks are trained in all aspects of the role, including a knowledge of the law affecting local authorities and this can be very complicated in this day and age. The majority of the current Town Councillors are new to the role and will rely on the advice of the Clerk.
