## Would you like to attend this meeting?

t Ives Town Council are holding a public meeting about the Draft Masterplan (see RP 117) but the number of people being allowed to attend is limited and only eight members of the public will be allowed to speak.

The meeting, due to take place at 7pm on 5th October in the Flex room of the Corn Exchange, means that space is limited and only around 30 residents will be able to attend.

The Council have issued an agenda

The Council have issued an agenda which includes the following notes for attendees:

- (1) Comments will be returned to HDC by 26 October 2022.
- (2) There will be an opportunity for a maximum of 8 residents, or appointed representatives of neighbourhood groups to speak at the meeting for a maximum of 5 minutes each.
- (3) Comments should be sent in advance of the meeting to democratic@ stivestowncouncil.gov.uk and will be summarised as part of the Council's submission.
- (4) Residents are also able to comment directly to HDC using the website link above.
- (5) To comply with fire regulations the Flex Room can hold a maximum of 50 persons so attendance may be limited.

#### Is this important?

Some of the plans ideas may seem a bit far fetched and a flight of fancy,

but its proposals could be adopted as these comments in this week's Hunts Post by Sarah Conboy, leader of HDC imply. She said:

'One priority for us is to deliver the Market Towns Programme, which includes . . . St Ives'. She continued, 'We are working with designers and analysts to create a potential vision for each of the towns, which gives us something to aspire to in the future'. To be fair she did also say, 'It really matters that local people

take a look and help us to shape them into the most suitable vision for each of our market towns.

So if you care about your town and how it will be over the next 20 or 30 years then you should take the time to study these proposals and give your view on them, or by default these plans could be adopted.

Why not show the Town Council that you care about your town by attending the meeting - 7pm 5th Oct at St Ives Corn Exchange?

#### Has the Council got it wrong?

Time will tell if restricting residents able to attend to about 30 is sensible and it raises several questions such as: How will the Council choose who will be refused entry if more than thirty people turn up? (see our suggestion below.)

Similarly who will be barred from speaking if nine people want to?



The council may argue that they cannot find a large enough room available between now and the deadline of 28th October 2022 for submissions

We have checked this and can confirm that the main hall of the Corn Exchange, capable of holding 200 people, is available on five occasions including all day on Saturday 8 and Sunday 9 October. Unfortunately this gives the impression that the Council may not be taking the matter seriously or that what residents think isn't so important. Shouldn't the Town Council be encouraging the public to comment not deterring them? The issuing of the proposals in the manner chosen by the District Council has not only made it difficult to read but completely bypasses residents who do not have the ability to go online.

At worst this decision suggests that public engagement will be minimal and only the views of a select few matter. When a public meeting was held about the Envar incinerator over 100 people attended. These plans are as far reaching, so why would so few be expected to attend?

## Wetherspoon expansion plans queried

A planning application by JD Wetherspoon to expand the Swan & Angel, St Ives into the neighbouring listed building, currently the offices of Copleys Solicitors (10 Market Hill), may not be straightforward. Wetherspoon claim they already own 10 Market Hill but an enguiry at the solicitors suggested that this may not be not the case. Residents at the rear of the buildings in Chapel Lane are concerned that the expansion, particularly of the beer garden, will further impact on them and increase the problems with large delivery lorries blocking the roads. If this was to go ahead this fine Grade II listed building will become another pub which could significantly impact that side of Market Hill.

#### 'New' Bins falling apart

The 'New' rubbish bins installed by HDC in 2020 look worse for wear, with some (right) falling apart. Criticised for their appearance when installed, the bins throughout the town centre are generally looking poor, a mixture of old and new designs with many rusty they do not give the impression of a town that cares about its appearance.

The loss of the Bus Station, to be replaced by a set of bus stops will force out market day coaches and destination coaches, who stop for maybe three hours. The Guide's Hut is not mentioned. north side of Station Road as an extension of the Town, making Waitrose less isolated. The latest proposals will not achieve that aim.

Only now is it admitted there will be a 'decked' i.e. multi storey carpark to replace the existing Cattle Market parking. Hidden away by Harrison Way it will not find favour with users. If this is built the aims of developing St Ives will not be met, St Ives will decline as users go elsewhere.




