Businesses concerned about Broadway proposals

ollowing the proposals to redesign the road layout of The Broadway by Cambs County Council (see RPs 148/149), 44 businesses have said they are concerned that the loss of parking spaces will damage them, particularly during this difficult trading period.

Along with their concerns, a public petition, objecting to the proposals, has been signed by 500 people. Corrine Harwood-Davey of La Muse said 'It is not our intention for the council to lose the funding for the scheme, but rather to limit the damage to business by removing so many parking spaces'.

Some of the businesses involved include Hephers, Janet Church Interiors, Townrow, Manifest and VK Gallery. In a letter accompanying the petition sent to CCC's Democratic Services the businesses stated that they not been consulted properly. It said 'Few had received the letter about the scheme although the Crop Shop had received 7 copies and the Norris Museum 6 copies in one day.' The letter requested that the business owners be established as consultees on the scheme to find a constructive way forward.

It requested that the letter and petiiton be sent to councillors. *The Riverporter* spoke with St Ives 'active' County Councillor, Kevin Reynolds, who told us that he agrees the scheme needs adjusting so as not to lose the ten parking spaces. In his response to Vanessa Kelly who is in charge of the CCC scheme, Kevin said:

'While it is good to encourage cycling. ... The Broadway is unusually wide, therefore one of the few areas capable of taking a nonstandard parking configuration [and] I strongly object to the current [parking] proposals on the following grounds:


The numbers are greatly reduced, to the detriment of the retail units in that end of the town. While I concede current arrangements are not satisfactory, due to no policing of the parking spaces...the original concept was for a 'pop in' and 'pop out' facility to increase footfall, which worked well when restrictions were enforced. Herringbone parking must stay! Moving disabled bays to this area makes little sense, as they are further from the shops. The [Victoria] monument would benefit from railings and/or cycle parking facilities [to] deter illegal parking and make cycling slightly more attractive'.

A comprehensive scheme Interestingly Kevin also went on to suggest something *The Riverporter* has promoted in the past, namely buses going through the Broadway to Market Hill. 'This will achieve increased vitality and footfall in the Broadway [and avoid some of the] problems buses encounter using the North Road route. I hope my suggestion are incorporated in any

Speculation has been rife for some time about the position of the Town Clerk, Matthew Price following an Extraordinary meeting of the Council in December(see page 3). *The Riverporter* understands that some councillors are extremely unhappy with the way the Council has been operating, with several resignations already and more likely.

River reaches highest recorded level but no house flooded

The recent flooding of some streets in town has provided an opportunity for more interesting pictures of St Ives (see page 2 also), as this moody shot of a canoeist on the river and meadow shows. The flood meadow regularly floods, hence its name, and fortunately the flood defenses, put in earlier this century, prevented residential properties from being badly affected. The fact that the river rose to its highest level ever recorded is significant. As I write the road at Earith is flooded, resulting in a lot of traffic, including large lorries, needing to use the Harrison Way bridge to access the A14 and beyond. This route, on occassions, become vital and questions are now being asked about the structure. Built in the 1970s, is the bridge capable of handling increasingly heavy vehicles and what's its life expectancy?

Subject: The reordering of The Broadway, St Ives

It has been brought to my notice by concerned fellow elderly neighbours at Harvest Court, that signage in Ramsey Road to divert large vehicles along North Road, will compromise their safety.

North Road forms part of the Busway for both A & B routes, and does have pinch points when buses confront lorries coming in the opposite

The safety of pedestrians on the North side of North Road between Harvest Court and No 14, is already compromised by the narrow width of the footpath and its camber(sloping as it does down to the road).

It is impossible to use a wheelchair or mobility scooter on this length of the footpath, and is painful for elderly pedestrians with arthritis. I will also point out that during heavy rain, the fact that surface water flows out of Globe Place car park into North Road, where three of the drains are almost permanently blocked with detritus, causing flooding and standing water. As a consequence, pedestrians can be subjected to a drenching by inconsiderate motorists.

Careful consideration must be taken regarding the wider environment when making alterations to traffic flows (a matter not taken up, some 40+ years ago, when West Street could have been made a through road into Ramsey Road and form part of a one way system with North Road).

Dear Valerie. The latest information about parking is that this will not be sorted until 2025. It was originally thought that Huntingdonshire District Council would be taking over responsibility for parking enforcement from the police this year. However the County Council will need to complete the road signs (yellow lines etc.) before the District can accept responsibility.

This means a delay because of there is a lot to be done throughout the whole district.

OTHER NEWS

Council agenda falls apart

The Editor knows that running a council is a difficult job, which seems harder each year due to legal requirements, the increasing administration required, health and safety issues and the protection of personal data. This came to a head on Wednesday, when the Town Council agenda was found to be illegal. A resident told the Council that they could not discuss the estimates and ratify the precept as some of the paperwork was missing. He also said that his details had been given in council minutes, without his consent, and he stated that the discussion of community grants should not be held in private as the agenda indicated.

The Council took on-board these comments, agreeing to delete the residents details from its minutes and did not discuss the Precept during the public session. Councillors did not discuss Grants to outside bodies during the closed session, as agreed, but did, quite illegally, discuss the Precept behind closed doors.

Councillors did adopted a new Town Councillor for the vacancy caused by the resignation of former Deputy Mayor, Craig Smith (see RP144). Four people who put their names forward, however Kathryn Campbell, withdrew before the meeting leaving the following candidates:

- John Kennedy who has worked at Waitrose for 40 years, having moved to St Ives in the 1990s. He is a member of the Parish Church and the Civic Society and a volunteer at St Ives In Bloom and for 12 years performed in the panto.
- Martin Gill who moved here in 1994 after working at RAF Wyton with 30 years service in the Army. He is an IT Project Manager due to retire soon. He recently stood as a Conservative candidate in the District elections for St Ives South where he came fourth.
- Jacqueline Spencer a resident of St Ives for 30 years. A Solicitor of a firm in Newmarket for 19 years she specialises in conveyancing. She is involved in local theatre, including Shakespeare at the George and latterly Huntingdon Drama club.

After hearing the candidates speak, councillors chose Jacqueline Spencer, as a Town Councillor. Another item discussed was an Auditors report which noted that the council had failed to comply with some regulations, which included not keeping the public informed by not issuing copies of The Bridge magazine for the whole of 2023.

One in and two out . . .

Following an Extraordinary Meeting of the Council on 9th November it was agreed that a panel consisting of Cllrs, Mokbul, Tiddy, Wells, Vala and the Mayor were to meet a member of staff to carry out disciplinary proceedings with delegated authority of the Full Council. The Riverporter understands that as a result Matthew Price is no longer in the role. The council has agreement with CAPALC for Libby White to give interim locum cover for 5 hours per week and will discuus the recruitment of a new Town Clerk at its Personnel Committee on 17 January.

Yet another Councillor, Monica Mallol Wright, resigned on 4th January and we are aware of one other councillor considering their position due to concerns about 'Things not being done properly. It appears that the Council has been hampered by the lack of experience on the Council. Many of the current councillors have either been adopted or elected unapposed and few have more than a couple of years in a role that requires not only time and dedication, but considerable skill and experience.

It is clear that the Mayor and long standing councillors need to step up as there is a fear that the council could hit the headlines for the wrong reasons.



Other news

County Councillor Douglas Dew, from Hemingford Grey, who defected to the Lib Dems from the Tories last January (RP126) has been made Vice-Chairman of the County Council. The Sorting Office in Bridge Street will close on 29th January and mail will probably have to be collected from Huntingdon.

Correction


