Wadsworth closes as Broadway plans criticised

n an ironic twist, one of the oldest and most unique shops in St lves, J Wadsworth (see page 2), announced its closure as plans to improve The Broadway came under fire. The two are not linked but *The Riverporter* believes something needs to be done to improve the town centre before it's too late.

As we reported in our last issue shopkeepers are unhappy with the plans that see the loss of 10 parking spaces, or 14 if you include the 4 designated for blue badge holders. The County Council, through Vanessa Kelly, said they would improve consultation with businesses but so far this has not happened.

A difficult issue

It is good that improvements are being considered, and that money has been found to do the work, but as is often the case in St Ives, the consultation with ALL parties was not done properly.

Currently, parking in The Broadway is restricted to one hour, with no return within two hours. As this has not been policed properly for many years the true effect of a period of free parking cannot be measured. Cars park all day, so shops haven't had the benefit of free parking as designed. The loss of the parking slots may make no difference until parking is enforced.

Will history repeat itself?

Many years ago a grand scheme for the town centre was abandoned

when residents objected to the plans the District imposed and HDC took the money away. Hence only the Bridge Street section was done. Will this be the case again? Will the money be taken away if this scheme doesn't get the go ahead? The recent debacle of the St Ives Masterplan (now called Vision) wasted over £50,000 creating a 'vision' hardly anyone wanted. St Ives County Councillor, Kevin Reynolds, agrees the plans need adjusting and Vanessa Kelly has said she will be ... 'undertaking further engagement' and 'design amendments may be made as a result of feedback'. However a meeting on Monday with councillors and a resident in The Broadway did not include any business representatives. Local groups, such as the Town Team and Civic Society have discussed the

and Civic Society have discussed the plans, as have local councillors and the hope is that discussions will take place with all interested parties to achieve a suitable outcome.

The Riverporter believes that any alterations in The Broadway need to be part of a plan for the whole town

centre. Plans that will improve the centre for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists. Plans that will improve the market, raise footfall and encourage business to come here.

A unique family

Wadsworth, the wine merchants in The Broadway is closing after 154 years of trading in St Ives.

John Wadsworth was Mayor in 1879 -1880. He was a member of the first council of the Borough of St Ives from 1876 to 1885.

In 1869 he started a company at number 1 Bridge Street John Wadsworth Mineral Water Manufacturer'. Wadsworth's delivery cart can be seen on the left of the picture below of Bridge Street.

By the turn of the century there were depots in Mildenhall, Ely, Chatteris and St Ives and another of his sons, Horatio managed the bottling works in St Ives. The sparkling drinks produced were supplied in special glass bottles. These used a 'marble' in the neck to keep the fizz in.

Today these are collectors items!




In 1879 the business expanded into the bigger market place of Cambridge. The new bottling works, which was located in Wellington Street, was run by one of his sons Ernest Arthur Wadsworth.



partnership with another local manufacturer, Barkers, becoming 'Barker and Wadsworth'. Sadly, after the Second World War, this closed. The bottling factory in St Ives, under the guidance of the late owner Mr Rex Wadsworth (the great, great grandson of John Wadsworth) moved into the wine & spirits market and in the early 1970's it relocated from Bridge Street to its present location on The Broadway. **ED's note.** It is sad that this unique shop, with such a great range of wines and spirits, most probably the best and largest in the region, is closing. Did they fail to market themselves for the 21st century? Perhaps calling themselves 'St Ives best kept secret' wasn't an appropriate message anymore

Phil cut the ribbon to formally reopen the Café and stayed to speak with the many visitors who were pleased the Corn Exchange doors were finally open again. Also there was Judith Barrass, presenter from HCR104FM, and organiser of the

monthly Jubado's comedy sessions at the Corn Exchange. Judith interviewed customers and staff as well as Cambs Police Sgt Andy Carrojana who was present for the inaugural 'Coffee with a Cop' drop in opportunity an initiative that they hope will be a monthly event. Dear Steve, we showed your letter to the Town Council, who organise the Langley Bread distribution, and they sent this response.

What is happening with the N'hood Plan?

Nick Dibben has informed us that: There were 50 written responses to the consultation and a similar number filled in the on-line questionnaire. There were over 300 individual comments and the NP team is currently working through these. The NP will be updated to reflect these. Where comments are not suitable for the NP they will be added to a list and shared with other parties such as the Town Council or Town Team that may be able to take them forward. A meeting was held with HDC this week to discuss their comments and ways forward agreed to ensure the NP is consistent with existing HDC planning policies, a key legal requirement. HDC have advised that there is a new flooding document coming out in March and given that the importance of flooding in St Ives, the NP will need too be updated to reflect this document, therefore the revised NP is unlikely to be sent to the Town Council before April.

Update on parking in Market Hill

We have been informed that the signage is up and there is now no reason for the covers on the

parking machines. But HDC have not been informed by CCC that they wish us to uncover the machine and restart enforcement action. So until that request is received the machines will remain covered and the cash-strapped County Council will not get the money it desperately needs.

Who or what broke our bridge?

On Tuesday eagle eyed Erik noticed that our famous bridge had been damaged.

We contacted County Councillor Kevin to let him know as the County Council are responsible for it. He sent us this assessment from officers at CCC.

'Whilst it does stand out due to the sandstone I do not believe it to be anything other than a section that has either been pulled off or popped off due to the recent cold snap. [We] can see if it is worth carrying out a repair when we do the flood arches, or if we just let it weather and pick it up in a few years when a new pointing scheme is required. We wouldn't need HDC/Heritage England permission as it would be classed as maintenance work.
