Sometimes we just scratch the surface

n article in last Saturday's Guardian said the number of local journalists scrutinising councils, interviewing MPs and keeping track of local developments fell by 9,000 over the past 15 years, which MPs and experts have said is having a devastating effect on the scrutiny of local democracy.

A reader, who made us aware of the article, said it made them think of The Riverporter, Well it was one reason why we started this paper, as the other local papers were not reporting on events in St Ives. Of course it's quite difficult to always give totally accurate reports for a variety of reasons, including that some organisations want to keep some things secret and don't communicate with us and sadly some people just lie.

Over the past year we have reported on several matters involving the Town Council and councillors which have never quite been resolved. One such matter was about the running of the Burleigh Hill Community Centre, that appeared in RP137 last June, when we reported on a Council Meeting at which Councillor Andrew Riddell gave a critical verbal report, that was later determined to be beyond the scope of the Council.

Last month (RP153) we reported that the Council issued an apology to Councillor Burke and Angela Dickinson, former Trustees of the Burleigh Hill Centre, because of the consequences of the June meeting that resulted in them being wrongly accused of improprieties.

The true effect of last June's meeting is now coming to light and appears to include unjustified criticism of Burke and Dickinson, the resignation of Councillor Craig Smith (see RP144). unhappy with what had happened, and since then the dismissal of the former Town Clerk, Matthew Price.

Eye taken off the ball

To some extent this created an atmosphere of distrust particularly between councillors and staff. The details of Matthew Price's dismissal have not been given, but there was obviously serious concerns about his behaviour that prompted the Council to sack him. This not only



Rescue Centre urges dog control




Two dogs attacked a cygnet near the River at St Ives at about 08:30 GMT on Monday last, The Waterfowl Sanctuary said. Graham Porter, from the charity, said the incident lasted 'several minutes'. The RSPCA said dog owners had a legal responsibility to keep their dogs under control in public places.

The bird was being treated with antibiotics at the rescue centre in Godmanchester for the bites that went through the skin and tore a bit of the muscle. Mr Porter said: 'A week rarely goes by when I don't have to patch up an attack by a dog on a swan.'

A Cambridgeshire Police spokesperson said it was contacted shortly after the attack in London Road and added: 'The owner of the dogs put them back on leads and left the area.'

County Council latest news

Regarding the Broadway scheme - Cambridgeshire County Council have asked us to let you know about the drop-in event they will be hosting about The Broadway walking & cycling scheme on Wednesday 27th March between 4 and 6.30pm in St Ives Town Hall. Please come along to find out more about the project, the changes being proposed and how you can feed back your views.

The County Council also said. 'Overall, it is envisioned that the changes will create a more pedestrian environment, rather than the existing vehicular/carriageway one, whereby making The Broadway more invitina to pedestrians. [Hopefully] footfall will increase, and new businesses will be encouraged to move to the area. Town Council co-opts a new member

On last week's council agenda, councillors were asked to consider co-opting someone for the South Ward vacancy, created when Monica Mallol Wright resigned in January. There were two candidates a Mr Martin Gill and Mr Martin Page. Mr Page, a Chartered Town Planner who has lived in St Ives since 1984 and worked for HDC and Barfords was selected by councillors.

Old faces mentioned in dispatches

Long-time readers will remember two people who made the headlines in past issues of *The* Riverporter. For different reasons they cropped up again in the news. Jason Ablewhite's name sprung to mind when the Government's new Cyber-flashing law saw it's first conviction. Meanwhile County Councillors Stephen Ferguson and Alex Bulat discussed the role of County

Councillors on a video link. Although they thought the £11,000 allowance was not enough to do the role properly, referring to Ryan Fuller (who has allegedly moved to Thailand) Councillor Ferguson said it was outrageous that Councillor Fuller only attended two meetings a year (the minimum to get the allowance) and only stayed for half of those meetings. He suggested that every single person who voted for him or lives in his Division should be offended by that.

Ed's Note: Ironically this week I received notice of my old-age pension for the year. It will be slightly less than Cllr Fuller's £11,133 allowance for attending less than 6 hours a year at Shire Hall! Cllr Fuller did attend Tuesdays County Council meeting, his first this year, and avoided being kicked off the Council. A cheap return flight to Bangkok is around £600.
