'Incredible' event highlights police demand!

gas explosion, a hoax stabbing, a fire in a prison, and dangerous driving, were just some of the calls received by Police during a 'Postathon' event. Between 4pm and 9pm on Friday 25 October, call handlers received 183 calls, ranging from serious collisions to missing Amazon deliveries.

Cambs Police Force took to social media to share a short summary of all the calls during the five-hour event to highlight the volume and variety of incidents police are faced with on an average Friday evening. The 'Postathon' coincided with national Control Room Week, an annual event designed to showcase the work of the control room.

Of 183 calls received, 23 were silent, 9 were reports of domestic abuse, 12 were violent incidents, 6 were regarding missing people and 11 were road related.

Social media users shared their thoughts with one saying, 'these updates are an amazing insight into life in the control room'.

Superintendent Nick Church, Head of Demand, said: 'This is the fifth time we have done this for Control Room Week and every year it is no less eyeopening for the public to see just how busy our phone lines are.

'The incredible demand we face is why we encourage online reporting in non-urgent situations, as it is not always possible to have an operator on the other end of the phone if it's not deemed to be an emergency.

During the Postathon, a man called 999 because his Amazon parcel had arrived empty, two people reported that their Facebook page had being hacked, and a man called to report that someone had put children's toys in his hin

Police also received a call of a reported stabbing, which later turned out to be a hoax. A man was consequently arrested on suspicion of wasting police time.

The public are reminded they should only use 999 in emergencies. For non-urgent matters call 101. This ensures call handlers will always be available to arrange help for those who need it most.

Heart of St Ives, Muriel Moore has died

uriel, who was awarded - The Heart of St Ives Award by Mayor Phil Pope in May 2018, typified the welcoming St Ives spirit, according to the citation. There was no doubt she was known and loved by locals and visitors from far and wide. (See picture right and RP9)





Muriel and her husband Bill lived over the well-known tobacconist and confectionery shop in the Broadway. Muriel's father, Ted, took over the shop in 1930 and on his retirement in 1969 Muriel and her mother ran the business until she too retired.

Bill, born in Tipperary, served in the RAF at Wyton as Traffic Controller and met Muriel over a cup of tea when she visited Wyton on Sports Day. They married in 1951. The picture above, taken by George Dellar for the New Millennium book, shows Muriel and Bill in 2000 when they celebrated the shop's 70th year in the family. Bill died in 2003 and soon after Muriel had to close the shop but she stayed living there, regularly knitting and doing her

jigsaw puzzles whilst chatting to everybody that went past the always-open front door. Muriel featured in the last issue of *The Riverporter* when she attended the opening of the Michaelmas Fair to receive the thanks of the Fairground organisers for her support over the years, just two weeks before her death (see right).

Muriel died on 28th October aged 92 and her funeral service will take place at All Saints Church, St Ives, on Monday 25th November at 12pm followed by a private family committal. Family flowers only, but donations welcome to the Rotary Club of St Ives.

This must be one of the best examples of conservation we have seen for some time.'

This is well-deserved recognition for the Island's many volunteers, especially because it has been a tough year. The clean-up operation after a flood is a big undertaking, and there have been quite a few of those! With the regular working parties to maintain the Island, organised by Huntingdonshire District Council, bird-ringing, wildlife monitoring, Family Fun Days and group visits, it adds up to a massive 300+ hours a month of combined volunteering.

There was good turnout of St Ivians for the Cambs CC Highways' consultation at the Corn Exchange this week.

I was told the biggest concern raised to date was the impact on St Ives of their proposed Huntington bypass ending at Wyton Airfield. Like me, others had questioned the sense of funnelling through traffic in particular HGVs. from Spittals to the airfield, then on along Sawtry Way, along the A1123 and St Audrey

Their modelling to date suggests that the impact will be 'neutral' given the resultant numbers of drivers who would take to buses to get to Huntingdon following other proposed changes.

Hmm. Wonder how many HGV drivers will use buses instead.

Apparently, new modelling on its way may produce other answers! And they haven't discounted extending the bypass around St Ives if enough people want it!!

St Ives residents have expressed alarm

Residents are concerned that the CC Highway's plan to build a new road linking the A14 at Spittals with Wyton Airfield will make congestion much worse. Consultation on the scheme closes on November 27. Have your say at: www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/A141-Stlves.

A separate consultation document issued by Huntingdonshire DC describes Wyton Airfield as one of their assessed 'land availability' sites for housing development. The Ministry appears to have indicated to HDC that it is ready to convert much of the site into housing. Since the Election the new Government has also indicated there will be a Ministry of Defence review which will include an appraisal of their land holdings. Hence, it appears, the Cambridgeshire CC plan for the new bypass to Wyton Airfield, linking the site to the A14 and easing congestion around Huntingdon. However, St Ives residents point to the direct continuance of the route, along Sawtry Way, into St Audrey Lane and on to the A1123 - a notorious congestion blackspot. Residents themselves have surveyed HGVs passing their homes over a full week, 24 hours each day. They counted on average one HGV travelling along this route every 52 seconds between the hours of 05:30AM and 10:30AM daily and every 63 seconds between the hours of 10:30AM and 4PM daily. The survey also showed that, during that week, 18% of HGVs were local operators; a further 6% could not be identified as either local or national/international operators. The conclusion was that up to 76% of the HGVs travelling through St Ives originated their journeys from much further away.

Funnelling more traffic from Spittals on to these roads, as an alternative to using the A14 would worsen congestion - not make an 'improvement', as the CC scheme suggests. In their first webinar on the Huntingdon and St Ives Improvement Scheme, a Cambridgeshire CC representative said modelling showed the impact on St Ives of the new road would be 'neutral'.

The bottle shop has been forced to close

The 40ft converted shipping container in Harrison Way was launched in 2021 and the owner Matthew Kelly said: 'We're autted to have to be making this decision but the costs just keep going up and up and its not



viable for us to stay open. 'We won the biggest industry accolades in the UK, being crowned independent Beer and Cider retailer of the year and Food and Drink Start Up of the year in 2023, so having to shut down feels like a real loss for the town and wider region.

They will be selling down their stock on Fridays and Saturdays but only for the next few weeks. Mr Kelly confirmed that The Snug, a separate business will not be impacted by the Filling Station closure and remains open. Matthew looks forward to a busy Christmas trading period.


