Ho Ho Ho it's Christmas . . .

This is the eighth Riverporter Christmas for St Ives and each year there has been much to report.

2025 has been no exception with lots happening in our area and we end the year printing more copies than ever, so more of you can read our local news. Every single issue is also available online at www.theriverporter.uk.

2025 has been interesting to say the least. It began with ex-Ivo teacher, David Chambers and 2nd World War veteran, Ed Kelly, being mentioned in the King's New Years Honours list. Ed was also awarded the Freedom of St Ives in August, but sadly died, aged 101, in September.

We also lost The Riverporter's best news hound Erik, ex-Mayor Martin Collier, Free Church stalwart Stuart Denham, popular landlord Jerry Schonfeldt and boxer Joe Bugner, once of St Ives who died in Australia.

The 600th Anniversary of our Mediaeval Bridge saw huge crowds watch troops from the English Civil War Society blow it up on Saturday 26th July and wage battle at Hill Rise Park over the weekend, where there was a fabulous living history display.

Other events included WOW Day, where hundreds walked the Ouse Valley Way; Toll Bridge Day, when people crossing the bridge had to play a game to cross. Picnic in the Park, the Carnival & Music Festival and The Old Riverport Jazz & Blues Festival which was bigger and better than ever and an added bonus was the Freedom of The Town Parade which was led by the Band of the Welsh Guards and drew thousands to watch.

It was also a political year that saw two new County Councillors elected. Julie Kerr, who was also made Town Mayor, won the St Ives North & Wyton seat and Labour's Alex Bulat won the St Ives

South & Needingworth seat. The first time the Conservatives had failed to be elected. After years of waiting, Parking Enforcement was at last taken over by HDC to the shock of many who received tickets. The year ended in more controversy as the A141 improvement plans were deemed totally unworkable and the Draft Local Plan totally unreasonable without massive improvements in infrastructure and a better A141 plan.

On top of these concerns, UK Government plans to reorganise local government created divisions among Cambridgeshire's councils. It resulted in Huntingdon MP Ben Obese-Jecty calling some councillors traitors and a severe rebuke from St Ives Mayor, Julie Kerr and Buckden District Councillor Martin Hassall (RP 198).

Riverport Radio enjoyed a summer day trip to Hunstanton on a new route from St Ives by Whippet Coaches. Not a reference to the Charge of the Light Brigade but a fitting tribute to the Town Team to mark their re-enactment production in July which commemorated the 600th anniversary of our town's bridge, attracting 5,000 visitors.

On Friday 5th December the Civic Society acknowledged the exceptional work of the Town Team in promoting the town's heritage with a presentation held at the Golden Lion. Civic Society Chair, Christine

Phillpotts, presented the Town Team's Chair, Sheila Stones with a Certificate of Appreciation and, to mark their appreciation, gave honorary memberships of the Civic Society for the year ahead to each member of the Team.

Public frustrated at Local Plan meeting

A packed Civic Society's meeting (below), held last week to examine the implications of the proposed developments outlined in HDC's Local Plan, caused great concern among attendees. It began with Simon Ward, a local resident giving his view of the Plan, which essentially outlined that without serious improvement in the road network, the housing being proposed should not be accommodated. It became clear that there was concern on many fronts from those attending. Issues such as the environment, school places, water supply and indeed flooding were mentioned.

Paul Boothman, of H&W PC, urged those present to demand HDC pauses the plan until Local Government Reorganisation is complete, which might enable us re-evaluate the appropriate level of development we can absorb with the proper infrastructure.

The obvious frustration with the process was evident from all quarters - the short consultation time of 6 weeks on a 476 page document - the fact that this might be the last chance for the public to comment - the seeming lack of previous consultation - concern over damage to the environment and that the proposed A141 improvements are unworkable, all weighed heavily on the meeting.

Although some people felt that

the public's views might be ignored it was pointed out that public pressure was likely to be the only way that the Council will take notice. (After all it was public pressure that resulted in the formation of the Civic Society and the opening of Harrison Way in 1980 to prevent Hemingford Meadow being destroyed).

The meeting ended with those present being urged to respond to HDC's consultation by Wednesday 17th December, the closing date.

A message from Alex Bulat, County Councillor, St Ives South and Needingworth

As the new year approaches, it is a good moment to look back on the main events of 2025 and to consider the priorities for our community in 2026.

Over the past eight months representing St Ives South and Needingworth on the County Council, I have learned a great deal from local residents. Whether through conversations on the doorstep, my monthly surgeries at the Library or at the many community events held in the town, I have valued the opportunity to listen and learn. I would like to thank everyone who has taken the time to write to me or speak with me in person over recent months. Local councillors are elected to raise and address the concerns of residents, and the more people are willing to engage, the stronger and more representative local decision-making becomes.

It has been a busy period at the council, with debates on Local Government Reorganisation, where I made the case against St Ives being merged with Peterborough, and various committees where I raised local issues, from the busway

to the St Ives sluices. I have also worked constructively with councillors from across the political spectrum to ensure residents' views were properly represented during the A141 consultation and other local matters. That said, much of a councillor's work takes place away from the headlines. OTHER NEWS

The Langley Bread

The annual St Ives tradition of the Langley Bread distribution will be upheld at 10am on Wednesday 14th January 2026, at St Ives Corn Exchange. 100 grocery bags comprising bread, jam, teabags, sugar and biscuits will be distributed. Eligible recipients are widows and widowers who are on the electoral register for St Ives.

Sewage discharge sparks concern

A dramatic increase in sewage discharges has raised alarm bells in Huntingdonshire, prompting urgent calls to address the growing environmental crisis.

Councillor Martin Hassall, spearheading efforts to tackle the issue said 'Trend data is only produced annually in arrears, making the whole process opaque. This significantly hinders our ability to understand and respond to emerging problems in real-time.'

Hassall has lobbied the Environment Agency and they have now fitted a 'Sonde' (right) to monitor the levels of pollution downstream of the Buckden Water Treatment Centre. He wants to see similar devices for all of the county's rivers.



Anglian Water maintains that the discharges are permitted and not classified as pollution, while the Environment Agency suggests these authorisations are necessary to prevent sewage from backing up into homes. 'We're effectively choosing between protecting properties and damaging our environment, a choice that residents shouldn't have to support', continued Hassall.

Anglian Water's ageing sewage infrastructure is already under severe strain, yet new housing proposed in the Huntingdonshire Local Plan is routinely tied into the network as a matter of course. Connection concerns raised by Anglian Water or residents can be overlooked in the planning process, leaving us exposed to worsening pollution.

In 2024 there were 1,329 sewage dumps into the River Great Ouse in Cambridgeshire, lasting a total of 17,602 hours - equivalent to over 2 years of continuous pollution.

Update from the Town Council

Three new Councillors are now in post: Cllr Jeff Massey, Cllr Keith Brown and Cllr Craig Smith, following co-option to the Council. Town Council Elections will be held on 7th May 2026 and The Bridge Magazine has been sent out to all residents. Hard copies are available from the Town Hall and can be viewed on St Ives Town Council website.

At December's Council meeting, councillors discussed nine grant applications from local groups totalling just under £60,000. The amounts being awarded will be decided at January's meeting, when the funds available will be known. The Council did decide that 6% of the Precept will be allocated for grants. In past years this has been a higher figure but financial constraints prevent this. This is likely to mean that around £73,000 will be allocated for grants but this figure also includes money for the Norris museum, which last year amounted to £33,000, reducing the money for other groups to about £40,000. Finally the Civic Sunday Parade next year will be on Sunday 20th September.

TWIG Volunteers Induction Day

Having now set up the working group to get the Thicket Woodland Improvement Group up and running, its volunteers met the Ranger allocated to shape and oversee the work to be done. One of the early steps will be to establish what ecosystems exist within the woodland to create a baseline for the working parties activities.

An induction day has been set up to provide volunteers with training, support and materials to be held on January 8th, 2026 at 6pm. There are 4 places still available. Anyone interested in joining the group should contact: Chair@stivescivic.org.uk

Campaign for Arthur Rank Hospice

Local Lib Dems are backing a campaign to protect funding for Arthur Rank Hospice, where cuts threaten to lead to the closure of nine beds there.

Cllr Sarah Conboy, Hunts Lib Dem Group Leader said: 'The cuts to Arthur Rank Hospice will have a massive impact on patients across the county, including here in Huntingdonshire. End-of-life facilities like Arthur Rank are so important.' Over 16,000 people have already signed the petition to the Health Secretary to protect the beds at Arthur Rank, showing how concerned local people are about this.
